CHAIRMAN'S THOUGHT

We are delighted that after a lengthy break in our activities we have embarked on what is almost a normal voyage through the Gundog season.

Training has gone well although some have been unable to attend when they would have liked. It has been difficult to cram the usual sessions in to a shorter period of time.

We want our training to remain relevant and address the needs of our members. It is possible that this can be achieved in the current structure. However it is becoming increasingly clear that picking-up teams are often a mixture of conventional retrieving breeds (Labrador, Golden & Flatcoat Retriever etc) and spaniels. Does our training need to change to reflect this? I expect a lively debate and hopefully we will have plans in place to put before the next AGM.

I would recommend to all trainees with mature dogs that you consider entering the Working Gundog Certificate test. The certificate is generally accepted as an indication that dog and handler are competent and suitable for most Shoots. Our next test for Certification will be held next summer following the completion of our training programme, hopefully again in collaboration with the Duchy Club.

Further details of the all the Tests that are to take place are on the website but if you feel that you would like further details then please contact one of the training team.

The Game Fair

This year I attended this splendid event for the first time. It was great to see so many enthusiasts together in such a setting. I am sure that many of you were also attending and it was good to see some familiar faces on the day I attended.

I was sorry to miss our Spaniel Field Trial Secretary Val competing in the Working Gundog Challenge but the parts I did see were great fun.

I also had the privilege of seeing the HPR International competition. Despite the heat and the confined ground it was most impressive. I do have a soft spot for these dogs having once owned an English Pointer - 'Smokie'.

As with many things I wish I knew then what I know now.

I know that many feel that HPRs are unsuitable for North Devon but there are a number of owners and occasionally they sign up for training. Lumping them in with either the Spaniels or Retrievers is clearly unsatisfactory. I wonder if there is some unmet need here. If you know of people not necessarily members who own such dogs encourage them to contact me and we will see whether a small group can be formed. Access to suitable ground guaranteed!

We're after all not a Retriever Club and/or a Spaniel Club but a Gundog Club open to everyone interested in the Sport.'

TREASURERS TITBITS – YOUR TREASURER'S VIEW

Money generally makes the world go round. North Devon Working Gundog Club revolves around funds raised from subscriptions, shop sales, entry fees, training and club events, to run Working Tests, Field Trials, and more recently, Gundog Certificate day, Simulated Game day and the promotion of gundog activities both locally and nationally. All of these events have significant costs, but the club is run completely by your committee and a few other dedicated members all of whom operate on a completely voluntary basis. So, we do rely on the generosity of our committee members, working test secretaries, Field Trials Secretaries and Trainers, Chairman, Secretary, Membership secretary, Club Secretary and not forgetting your Treasurer and everybody else who helps organise, run, and sell in the shop and administer the club for all the hard work. Our Landowners generously allow us to use their shooting facilities to run a field trial without charge, I say thank you so much. Your club does make charitable donations to charities nominated by these Landowners. Without the generosity of all these people, the club's business would be much harder. I'd like to thank everybody for their generosity to the club.

Each season, your treasury accounts for over 800 transactions - both income and expenditure. So, there is a great deal of work goes into collecting monies and banking them, paying the clubs expenses, and accounting for it all properly.

In our last proper season (2019) club turnover - income from all sources - amounted to £16,400 and our costs were £12,970 so income exceeded costs by 26% leaving a surplus of £3,430. That was a good year! In leaner years, if we are very careful, we break even. Sometimes we make a small surplus. The club does hold good reserves through careful management by your committee over the years. Like everybody else Covid has meant the club has had no activities for over a year. Luckily our members have stayed with us and their support has covered the overhead costs of last year to give us a break even position. The club is now waking up from Covid with a full training programme with lots of students, we are about to hold our first working test of the season and we have a good programme of field trials ahead of us. It's great to be busy again.

One of the positive things to come out of Covid has been a rethink of the way we handled cash. We have essentially moved to a cashless society. It is so much easier for your club officers to just swipe a card or to check an online bank statement for a payment than to have to handle cash or cheques. I would urge all our members to think cashless in their dealings with the club. Its quick, its easy, and it is bio secure. Most of all with no banks in town, it saves your treasurer hours of time. So please think electronic in your dealings with us – pay your sub by standing order and bring your card to training sign up or to buy from the shop. For competitions we are moving to an online registration system called FTMS which again is electronic payment, even when it returns payments to you. Please, please update your standing orders to the current rate of subscription as you are not a paid-up member for competition entry until we have the full subscription. We also do all our accountancy electronically with a simple system.

So before I close, please just spare a thought for your treasurer - attending events and being handed a bag of cash and cheques in the middle of a windswept field in the pouring rain, and if he's lucky the bag will contain a slip of paper explaining what the money is for - entry fees, raffle monies, membership subs, not forgetting some shop sales - and going home to spent the evening drying out all the notes, counting all the cash and trying to read the smudged explanatory note so that he can account for it properly and pay it into the bank! How it didn't all blow away, never ceases to surprise me. The slightly dubious privilege of being your clubs treasurer is full of surprise and excitement and its great to have the excuse to attend all these events to help everybody enjoy the delights of watching competitors and their dogs do the unthinkable to win a competition.

A VERY DIFFERENT EXPERIENCE

Over the years I have watched and enjoyed many field trials, across all of the gundog breeds, except for one, and that was the Pointers and Setters. In late July, I had the opportunity to remedy that omission when I received an invitation to attend the Pointer Club's Open Stake on Apedale Moor, near Reeth in North Yorkshire. Happily, the date of the trial coincided with the time my wife Penny and I were spending on holiday with friends, just ten miles distant.

I was encouraged to have a day indulging my personal interest and crossing an item off the bucket list. And so off I went heading for Lord Bolton's grouse moor and a very new experience. Conditions for working dogs were ideal, overcast with some breeze but only a few spots of rain throughout. A great contrast to the scorching heat that had been experienced only a few days previously. Carole Brown, the club's Field Trial Secretary gave me an introduction and it wasn't long before I found myself in great company, many new faces but all most welcoming to someone who was a complete novice in their specialised gundog world.

The first surprise was that Carole started the day with forty runners. It was an Open Stake and although organised by the Pointer Club it was open to any appropriately qualified Pointer or Setter. Four different breeds ran in the stake of which the Pointers were in the majority, but I also saw Gordon Setters, English Setters and Irish Red Setters performing on the day. After the introductions and briefing were given, the draw was made to determine the pairing of the dogs.

The next surprise was that the judges ensured that all dogs ran into the wind. Perhaps I should have worked that one out for myself, but it really wouldn't have been possible any other way. As the pairs were brought forward for their run, they were cast off in opposite directions by their handlers and worked a beat of 80 - 100 yards in either direction, crossing each other's path as they ran. These are all air scenting dogs and it was quite spectacular to see them touch scent and come on point. Once the handler indicated to the judges that their dog was 'on point' they were asked to walk forward with the 'gun', a role played by Ian Sleightholm, the Head Keeper, and encourage their dog to flush the game in front of them. Sometimes a single bird, but more often a small covey of grouse was quick to flush, but quite often the birds were moving forwards in front of the dog and proved somewhat reluctant to get up. That was a real test of the relationship between handler and dog, to ensure that the movement was fast enough to gain a flush but not so uncontrolled that the dog ran in. When a successful flush was achieved, the gun fired a shot in the air to test the dog's steadiness. Of course, the stake took place well before the 12th August, the opening date for the grouse season and so no birds could be shot.

I was told that Pointers and Setters are not expected to retrieve, their task is to find and then flush game from a large expanse of open ground. When they are employed in a walked-up shooting situation during the season, a retriever is used to find and return the shot birds.

I didn't find it difficult to understand the principal ways the dogs were assessed by the judges, although, for sure, I wouldn't have understood many of the finer performance points. There were obvious differences in pace and style and how well different dogs worked their ground, and then demonstrated their steadiness on point. And just like in spaniel trials, those that missed game were immediately eliminated.

After a long day, a five-year-old Irish Red Setter bitch, FTCh Shanrycon Diamante owned and handled by Steve Robinson was declared the winner. She was certainly the one that caught my eye too.

Kennel Club Rules and Regulations

(excerpts taken from www.thekennelclub.org.uk/media/3465/field-trial-j-regulations.pdf)

The following are definitions of certain stakes: (Regs J 3 d)

Open: A stake in which dogs have the opportunity of gaining a qualification towards the title of Field Trial Champion (K Regulations refer) and towards entry in the Championship or Champion stake for its breed; in which entry is open to all dogs of a specified breed or breeds except that such Stakes may not be confined to Any Variety Spaniel [except Spaniel (Cocker) and (English Springer)]. It may be limited to a prescribed number of runners (J4 refers), in which case these shall be decided by a draw conducted in accordance with Regulation J7.i. and J7.j. so that preference is given to previous performance.

Novice: Retrievers, Spaniels and breeds which hunt, point and retrieve: A stake which is confined to dogs which have not gained a place, or places, which would qualify them for first preference in the draw for Open stakes. Pointers and Setters: A stake which is confined to dogs which have not gained a first, second or third in open stakes or first or two seconds in All Aged, Novice or Puppy stakes prior to the close of entries.

1. Dogs entered at Kennel Club Licensed Field Trials must be registered at The Kennel Club in accordance with Kennel Club Regulations for Classification and Registration B. All dogs resident outside the UK must be issued with a Kennel Club Authority to Compete number before entry to the show/event can be made. All overseas entries without an Authority to Compete number will be returned to the exhibitor/competitor (JRegs 7.a,b).
2. The Society reserves the right to refuse and entry or nomination. Any such refusal shall be reported to the Kennel Club (JRegs7.d).
3. If entries or nominations exceed the number of permitted runners, the right to compete in a Trial shall be decided by ballot (subject to Regs J7i, see also J7j) (JRegs 7e).
4. After an applicant has been successful in the draw for a place in a stake, or as a reserve has accepted an offer of a run, if the run is not taken up, the applicant may become liable for the full entry fee except: - (Regs J7f)
 - (1) Where the applicant has qualified out of Novice Stakes (where applicable) or,
 - (2) Where the dog drawn to run has qualified for the championship after entries have closed or,
 - (3) On production of a veterinary certificate confirming that the dog entered for the stake is unfit to compete or,
 - (4) On production of a medical certificate that the applicant / nominated handler is unable to compete or
 - (5) Where the dog drawn to run is withdrawn more than 7 days prior to the stake.
 - (6) The Club may, or may not, after an entry has been accepted, allow an applicant to substitute a dog before a trial with another dog owned by him or her, the dog must however, be eligible and no reserves standing.
5. Should circumstances so dictate the Society, in consultation with the Judges, may alter arrangements as necessary. Such changes and the circumstances surrounding them will be reported to The Kennel Club (Regs J5c x).

6. No modification may be made to the schedule after publication except by permission of The Kennel Club, followed by advertisement in appropriate journals if time permits before the closing of entries (Regs J 5c2).
7. Judges at a Trial are prohibited from entering a dog which is recorded in their ownership or part ownership (JRegs 6a3).
8. Videography and photography will only be permitted with the express permission of the Chief Steward and the host.
9. Welfare of Dogs. An exhibitor (or competitor) whose dog is entered at a Kennel Club licensed event should take all reasonable steps to ensure the needs of their dog(s) are met, and should not knowingly put their dogs' health and welfare at risk by any action, default, omission or otherwise. A breach of this Regulation may be referred to the General Committee for disciplinary action under Kennel Club Rules and Regulations. DOGS IN CARS ON HOT DAYS. Your dog is vulnerable and AT RISK if left in a vehicle in high temperatures and even on days considered as slightly warm. Please take care of your dog. If your dog is found to be at risk forcible entry to your vehicle may be necessary without liability for any damage caused (Regs J 2).

CLUB CONDITIONS & CODE OF PRACTICE

10. More than one dog may be entered but second applications will not be balloted until after the first applications have been balloted. Names of the dogs should be entered in order of choice.
11. The Club does not allow dogs to be substituted unless a Veterinary certificate is produced certifying ill health or bitch in season.
12. The OWNERS, including all JOINT OWNERS, of dogs entered for field trials must be members of this Society to get preference in the draw. Joint ownership will be considered the same as single ownership to have preference in the draw.
13. All Participants in the event (whatever their role) will be Briefed by the Chief Steward at the start and must follow the directions given by the Chief Steward – at all times.
14. Bitches in season must not be brought to the ground. (Regs J 9B2)
15. All dogs must be kept on a lead except when in line or used for picking-up under the direction of the judges or steward of the beat.
16. Risk assessments have been carried out for the Trial for Health and Safety and Covid 19. All those present must sign to say they have read and understood them.
17. Competitors are required to follow the code of practice and dress appropriately for the ground and for the occasion, in line with our Hosts, Guns and Keepers.
18. Trophies will be held for one year and it is the recipient's responsibility to ensure the safe return to the relevant Field Trial Secretary in time for the following year's Trial. The recipient is responsible for the engraving required and must return the trophy in the condition it was received.
19. Competitors must make their own arrangements for lunch.
20. Anyone wishing to attend the Trial to spectate, should contact the Field Trial Secretary in advance. Spectators attend at their own risk and must at all times obey the directions given by the Stewards.

If a competitor, or anyone in their household has Covid-19 related symptoms or has tested positive for Covid-19 they must not attend the event and should self-isolate in line with government advice. www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/self-isolation-and-treatment/when-to-self-isolate-and-what-to-do/.
